
IN MEMORIAM

PREFACE

In February of 1988, a committee was appointed by Dr. Lloyd E. Shaw, with approval of the Session of the First United Presbyterian Church, relating to the needs of Glenwood Cemetery. This committee was given a three-fold obligation. First, they were to gather the names of descendants of individuals buried in Glenwood Cemetery. Secondly, they were to seek to raise funds for the benefit of the cemetery. And thirdly, they were to suggest long range goals for the care of the cemetery.



Hopefully, you will find the name of a relative or friend listed on the roll of our honored dead listed in the back. The great English statesman Gladstone stressed this responsibility when he said:

"Show me the manner in which a nation or community cares for the graves of its dead and I will measure for you with mathematical exactness the tender sensibilities of its people, their loyalty to high ideals and their respect for the laws of the land."

We desire to perpetuate the ideals and faith of our forefathers. Therefore, as a people and a community, we must care for the graves of our dead in order that we might preserve our identity and our self-worth.

HISTORY

Glenwood Cemetery was started as a pioneer community burial ground. It had its beginning before the community of Collinsville was officially organized. In 1817, the Collins brothers moved from Litchfield, Connecticut to this area and purchased a parcel of land from the Federal government. The title shows the land was a part of the Illinois Territory, and the deed was signed by President Madison.

Four years after the Collins family arrived, the first death occurred which required a burial spot. Michael Squires, a worker on the farm of Peter Johnson, died. When the news was brought to William Collins, he walked out with the grieving neighbor to the highest spot on the ridge which was later to become Collinsville Cemetery. Mr. Collins is reported to have said: "Well, Stephen, we have not had to think of this before, but we will have to provide for it now. How would this spot do?" And they marked the spot for the first grave in Collinsville. In the years that followed, other pioneer families buried their dead on that same ridge.

Twenty-five years later the cemetery was platted for the first time and the tract was increased to three acres. William B. Collins, upon his death, left the property to his widow who in turn deeded it to the care of the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church. The church does not own it, but the Trustees have authority to provide for its care. All money from the sale of lots over and above current operating expenses is invested in a perpetual care account.

Although Michael Squires was the first official grave in the cemetery, there were a few others buried there who died before 1822. Two of these are relatives of William Nichols of East St. Louis. His great-great grandfathers Malcolm Nichols and Joseph Johnson, both of whom died in 1811, were later moved from family plots to Collinsville Cemetery by Peter Johnson, a family descendant who was also one of the first morticians of the community. They added to the pioneer forefathers who rest together in this hallowed place.

The first graves were placed in irregular lines with no definite pattern and this continued until the platting in 1847. Tombstones in those early days were of sandstone, which tends to crumbling. As a result, most of the inscriptions on the earliest stones are now illegible. For many years it was the only cemetery in Collinsville. Thus, people of all religions and nationalities are buried there. Rich and poor, native born and emigrants from Lithuania, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Ireland, Wales and other lands, all can be found buried near each other.

First records of the cemetery were destroyed in a fire in 1858. After that, Joshua S. Peers began an orderly system of record-keeping. Later, the task was turned over to Dr. James LaRue Wadsworth, a great benefactor of the cemetery over a long period. In 1884, he was instrumental in acquiring an increase in the size of the cemetery to its present 10 acres. A new system of grading and drainage was developed and new roadways were constructed. A general program of cleanup and landscaping was carried out under Dr. Wadsworth's direction. The name of the cemetery was changed to Glenwood from its original name, Collinsville Cemetery.

A sexton's home, built in 1896, was torn down in the early 1960s. Dr. Wadsworth was the donor of a handsome brick-pillar, iron-gate entrance which was erected in 1913 and replaced by brick pillars in the 1960s. These collapsed leaving the entrance open.

A vigorous program to beautify the cemetery was carried out in 1953 under the leadership of Al G. Weissler, then vice-president of the Board of Trustees. He was followed by other faithful members of the Trustees. Through the years, many dedicated individuals have given innumerable hours to do additional tasks such as trimming trees, cutting brush, uprighting overturned stones, and general maintenance beyond the regular work of the custodian. To all those who have provided this labor of love for the preservation of this hallowed ground, grateful thanks are due.

The history of the cemetery is more than its source, its care, and its maintenance. Within the graves of those buried there, there is the story of people. People who lived, who loved, who married, raised families, left their mark on the world, and then died. Most of these stories are unknown to us now, but records speak of some of them.

In 1849, there were 40 deaths due to cholera within 42 days. Among these were a stage coach driver, a Mexican laborer, a child from St. Louis. An irony of this calamity was that the doctor treating the sick, Dr. Joseph Lee Darrow, also contacted the disease and died. Such a disaster would emotionally intertwine a community and its burial ground. Another epidemic in 1918, this time influenza, caused many deaths also which added to the graves in Glenwood. Among these were Mrs. Fred Beidler who was remembered for having traveled to Washington to plead with President Lincoln to have her ill husband released from duty in the Civil War.

Glenwood is a minature military cemetery. In addition to the many children and adults who are buried there, there are a host of veterans and military dead. The oldest was the donor of the cemetery, William B. Collins, a Revolutionary War soldier. He had served in Col. Return J. Meigs' Connecticut Regiment during our struggle for independence. Also, there are some 90 Civil War Veterans. Among these were seven black veterans, one Confederate veteran, and one Congressional Medal of Honor winner, 1st Lt. Ninevah Shaw McKeen, 21 Vol. Ill. Inf.. He was one of the officers in command of the desperate charge made by Carlin's Brigade at the Battle of Lone River where 303 were killed and wounded out of 666 who were engaged. In addition, there are four veterans of the Mexican War, three from the Spanish American War, and three from the Black Hawk War. Others served in World Wars I and II.

A distinguished personality who rests in Glenwood is Joseph L. Darrow. He came to Collinsville from New England in 1835. Mr. Darrow distinguished himself in our community as a surveyor, medical doctor, and Deacon of the Episcopal Church. It is believed he did the platting of the cemetery and many of the streets in downtown Collinsville in 1847. Although there is no official record that he was ever ordained to the priesthood, he was a Deacon and led worship services. Christ Episcopal Church, the second church established in Collinsville, was organized and built under his direction. He He died of cholera in 1855.

Another noted personality who left his mark on the community rests in Glenwood. He was Lewis D. Williams, operator of the Bunker Hill Coal Mining Company and other mines in the Collinsville area. During the first half of this century, he supplied coal to many of the homes and businesses of the community. The Williams' family, especially in the person of his daughter, Anne Lew, has played a significant role in events of our community. Their family plot is just inside the cemetery's entrance.

Arthur Fletcher is another widely known personality numbered among our honored dead. Mr. Fletcher grew up in Collinsville and studied in the primary grades under the teaching of Irving Dilliard's mother, Mary Look Dilliard. He entered professional baseball and made a name for himself as a Shortstop for the New York Giants. Later, he became Manager of the Philadelphia Phillies. He closed his career as Coach of the New York Yankees. Now he rests in the community from which he sprung and launched his career.

The final chapter on the personalities of Glenwood has yet to be written. Burials are conducted at about six a year. Few lots are available for purchase. Burials usually take place in family plots. The task now is more service to the past, rather than for future generations.

Nevertheless, service is necessary. There in those graves are our roots. Lest we become a cut flower civilization, it is our solemn obligation to preserve those roots.

OUR NEEDS

In order to fulfill the obligation we have to care for the graves of our family ancestors, we, the Committee have felt it necessary to prepare a list of suggested needs. These needs are necessary to be fulfilled in order that proper respect and maintenance might be provided for our dead. To do less would show a lack of appreciation for their contribution to our lives and heritage.

The needs as we envision them are as follows:

- 1. A NEW CEMETERY MARKER. At the present time there is no name sign designating the cemetery. This need is being met by an anonymous donor who has volunteered to provide the attractive cemetery marker displayed on the cover of this booklet. Plans call for this marker to be built as soon as possible.
- 2. PAVING OF THE ROAD WITHIN THE CEMETERY. The present road has deteriorated badly. Some grading for drainage is also needed. We envision the need for the rebuilding and paving of the roadway throughout the cemetery.
- 3. ORGANIZATION OF CEMETERY RECORDS. There is need for computer software which will enable the Trustees to organize all the loose records of the cemetery for safekeeping and easy access.
- 4. INCREASING OF THE PERPETUAL CARE ACCOUNT. At the present time, there is approximately \$57,000.00 in the Perpetual Care Account. This provides the Trustees with approximately \$4,000.00 annually in interest to provide custodial care. They need additional endowment funds in order to increase their yearly income to keep up with inflation.
- 5. NEW TREE PLANTING. Many of the trees which were planted during an earlier landscaping project are now dead. To beautify the cemetery, some additional planting is necessary.

Being a community cemetery, support and contributions are also being requested from community organizations and businesses. Glenwood is Collinsville. The majority of those who developed this community now rest in this hallowed spot. Here our roots are intertwined with the forefathers of our community.

Financial gifts of all sizes are requested. Checks should be made out to the First United Presbyterian Church and marked "Cemetery Fund". All gifts are tax deductible.

In order to reach our needs, we recognize that we are going to have to receive a number of generous gifts. Therefore, special recognition will be given to those who make a generous donation. Two levels of giving will be acknowledged on a bronze memorial plaque that will be attached to the brick-wrought iron marker that is being erected at the cemetery entrance. Names of recognized donors will be inscribed under the following catagories:

- HONOR GIFT This level of giving will require a gift of \$3,000.00. Such a gift would truly honor the memory of a family ancestor through assisting in the perpetual care of this cemetery.
- PATRON GIFT A donation of \$1,000.00 will constitute a patron gift. This gift will show an earnest desire to share in this renovation project.

In addition to these gifts which will be acknowledged on the plaque, a record of all gifts will be kept with the cemetery records.

On the following page is a pledge card which can be clipped out and returned designating your support of this project. Please return it in time for the dedication service which will be held May 28, 2:30 P. M. Mail it to the First United Presbyterian Church, P. O. Box 326, Collinsville, Illinois, 62234.
